## **President's Comments from Charlie Markey**

Our Fiscal year end results, reflect another sound financial performance. We maintain a sound balance sheet with no long term debt and adequate cash on hand. We were recertified for three years by CARF, our international accrediting association, and met our safety and customer satisfaction goals.

As we begin our new fiscal year, I want to discuss the challenging economic landscape that we are currently facing. No doubt you have read about the slowdown in national and regional business. These companies drive our local economy and as a result, our business opportunities for both community employment of our participants and work in our production facilities. We will be working to understand the related impact to our business and actions that we can take to reduce our risk. Our staff is analyzing all of our business processes to help us reduce unnecessary expenses where possible. At the same time our caseloads have increased and we are adding staff to provide the additional support required. Thanks to our ability to quickly adapt, we are able to absorb theses changes and continue to provide excellent service to our participants and customers.

Meanwhile, our staff will be exploring new work opportunities in both community employment and organizational work for our participants. We are happy to announce a new relationship with RollRite of West Branch in which we will be kitting parts for their production facility. RollRite manufactures automatic covered tarping system for the transportation industry and is experiencing rapid

growth. If you have any additional ideas to obtain more community work, please contact us at the Arnold Center.

The Arnold Center is embarking on the roll-out of a new software system that will automate services and billing for our participants. The system will enhance the way we schedule, assign, and track the progress of our workforce; it will link to case management and accounting. We believe that staff productivity will improve and that less time will be spent in editing of our data. As always, the system will maintain confidentiality and manage the other risks associated with automation. We are currently expecting for the new system to begin operation in the second quarter of 2013.

Finally, I wanted you to know that as a result of our recent strategic planning process, we have activated a few board level committees to review our current vision and mission statements, develop a comprehensive marketing/ PR plan, and to look at long range building needs including at our Gladwin facility.

Thank you for a successful 2011/2012 year and for your continued support in the New Year.

## 2011-2012 Highlights

It was another very good year at the Arnold Center. Considering our current economy, it has definitely become more challenging to achieve results. But as they say, "When the going gets tough, the tough get going." As described below, in 2011/2012 our hardworking team saw a number of goals come to fruition and several significant milestones achieved:

- Developed and implemented a new LLC that provides paid vocational experiences and training to Saginaw youth.
- In an effort to enhance internal communications, the agency installed computer monitors at key locations within the organization's Gladwin and Midland sites to promote safety, recipient's rights, services, rules and regulations and calendar of events.
- Established and implemented a Cultural Diversity Plan and committee to help to promote synergy within the Arnold Center teams that enhances communication skills and brings in new attitudes and processes that profit the whole team as well as those served.
- Awarded the 2012 City of Midland Beautification Award for commercial properties because of sire and landscape improvements that benefit the community.
- The agency's quality improvement program decided to invest in Vertex system's comprehensive production, payroll, and billing and case management solutions to help make the organization more efficient and effective.
- Bid on and awarded Michigan Works! WIA contracts in Midland, Saginaw and Bay Counties.
- Renovated Gladwin location at the request of persons served to enhance accessibility.
- Earned CARF accreditation for the 13th consecutive time. No required recommendations by CARF, placing Arnold Center in the top 3% of all organization for the 10th consecutive year.
- Provided over 5,000 hours of training and education services to employees.
- Launched a new user friendly and accessible website that provides ready access to social media.
- Exceeded Funder, Customer, Advocate and Employer satisfaction goals in all program areas.
- Enhanced customer employment opportunities and reinforcement strategies, which contributed to a \$65,000 dollar increase in wages paid to program participants.

#### Certification to ISO 9001:2008







The Arnold Center has had the privilege of working with countless area businesses that understand the need for providing great service to others, both to their customers and community partners. The Arnold Center works closely with Community Mental Health and Michigan Rehabilitation Services to match work-ready individuals with the right employer in the community. There are a wide range of training options available to the candidates in our programs, each one tailored to their specific employment goals, such as:

Individual Placement

Job Development Services

Vocational Counseling

On-site job coaching and training

Application and Interview Preparation

Long term follow up supports

We also have several programs that connect individuals still in need of additional work supports with community employers in a wide variety of training scenarios. This typically involves an enclave of individuals working with a job coach to help supplement an employer's workforce, either part or full-time. These crews fill a precious need for labor within a business, while creating a valuable training opportunity for our participants.

Another valuable asset we have when trying to serve the needs of both area businesses and people in our programs, is access to 15,000 square feet of production space within our agency. Our production services specialize in inspection, packaging, assembly, sorting, mailing and recycling operations, all performed within our ISO facility. This provides an excellent opportunity for individuals to work on job skills, while creating a cost effective labor solution for businesses short on man power or space.

The Arnold Center is very proud to operate within a community that so readily looks at the good of others, and to partner with so many businesses that serve a greater good than their own. Thank you to all our community partners who help provide another year of opportunities for growth and inclusion to the people we serve.
